Executive Summary

The University campus is very salubrious and well planned spreading over 212 acres of land. HNGU University is having good amenities in the form of well endowed Central Library, excellent Computer Center. Separate hostels for boys and girls, Concerted Sports Complex, Health Center, perfectly clean Canteen, Post Office and Bank are available for University community. The campus life is a mix of rural and urban ethos. The knowledge seekers coming to study by design develop an aptitude for learning because of the innovative curriculum and diverse co-curricular activities that are an integral part of scholar life at Hemchandracharya North Gujarat University.

Ever since its inception in 1986, Hemchandracharya North Gujarat University served the North Gujarat region with enthusiastic zeal to impart qualitative and quantitative education and is looking forward to further expansion of its accomplishments in future to its potential zenith. The system of regular reviews of the existing courses and introduction of new courses of national and international relevance have been a major activity of the University to produce skilled, industry ready and employable human resources.

With hinterland of Hemchandracharya North Gujarat University consisting five districts namely **Patan**, **Mehsana**, **Aravlli**, **Banaskhantha** and **Sabarkantha**. The last two districts marked in bold are predominantly situated in tribal areas and the rest are in rural/semi-urban set up. Thus added challenge of the University is to bring the students from tribal and rural areas into the University system for availing the available opportunities of post graduate education and creating a milieu conducive to the education of rural and tribal students.

The HNGU is completely democratic in character. Right from the Department, the statutory bodies/organs like Executive Council, Senate etc., the entire functioning is participatory in point of view. Decisions are discussed and debated in all the bodies which have representatives from all sections of the academic community. A broad spectrum of Committees advise on wide ranging matters pertaining to issues such as campus amenities, institutional collaborations, financial allocations, health care, sabbatical leave, and a host of other issues. In the foreseeable future, the University is going to take up e-governance in a more effective manner. The administrators and non-teaching staff periodically undergo orientation programs in management so as to enhance their functioning in overall context of the University. In brief, the twin aspects of accountability and responsibility mark the governance of the University.

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

- The design and implementation of curricula at Hemchandracharya North Gujarat University are always planned keeping in mind the university's mission and vision. All major stakeholders are consulted during the process of designing courses and implementing them. This is a systematic, dynamic, democratic, continuous and ever-evolving process.
- There is a considerable amount of autonomy to the faculty, school and department levels for planning and developing curricular aspects. Need-assessment is a continuous process, involving experts, teachers and students; employability, innovation and research needs are taken into account when designing curricula.
- ➤ The university has proved to be a pioneer in several areas of curriculum design e.g. Vocational Studies Programme and various other emerging branches of science like Pharma regulation and Drug discovery. Quality sustenance and enhancement are always kept in mind when devising or revising the curricula.
- Admission to Hemchandracharya North Gujarat University is based on rigorous criteria, Merit of 12th standard, rank in competitive examinations and admission tests adapted to the demands of some departments. The university has implemented the Choice-Based Credit System at all levels. New programmes and courses in emerging areas have been introduced like B.Voc. (Fashion Design & Management, Tourism & Hospitality Management), Advance Diploma (Tourism Management, Banking & Insurance, Financial Services, Mobile Communication) PG Diploma in Pharma regulation and Drug Discovery, Industrial Safety.
- ➤ Students' feedback is an integral and indispensible part of curriculum design and implementation at HNG University. Such feedback not only shapes the planning and designing of courses; it allows course revision and change after the initial period of implementation. Feedback from experts is crucial for course design and implementation.

CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

- Admission to HNG University is completely transparent and studentfriendly process, from application to declaration/publication of admission test results; and details are accessible to everyone. The process is reviewed on yearly basis and improvements, if necessary, are implemented (e.g. Centralized admission online and online enrollment process, online exam forms) on a regular basis.
- > Students from backward and disadvantaged sections of society, especially those from remote rural areas, are encouraged to apply;

- there are many schemes and programmes for such students, including, scholarships, and Special hostel for SC/ST students, special facilities for differently-abled students and provision for remedial coaching.
- ➤ In addition to remedial courses, the university also offers preparation of competitive exams UPSC, GPSC, Bank PO, and many more... soft skills and other courses beyond regular class hours through GARDI CHAIR, Now University has SPIPA nodal study center with residential facility for preparations of Civil and other allied services.
- ➤ Orientation classes at the beginning of the academic session are a regular feature for the students to brief about facilities available to them (e.g. library and medical facilities, counseling services, Remedial classes); the university's zero-tolerance policy with regard to ragging and sexual harassment, among others. Student representation at various statutory bodies provides a platform to make the student community's views identified and contribute to planning for the future.
- ➤ Group learning, tutorials, mentoring, interaction with national and international experts, collaboration with industry, and involvement in project work from the undergraduate level onwards, free internet access and extensive laboratory work are some of the steps taken to make learning at HNG University student-specific.
- ➤ Innovations in teaching, encouragement of student participation in seminars and symposia, involving students in all important decisions have successfully combined to create an atmosphere of openness, creativity and flexibility.
- ➤ The HNGU faculty is well qualified and their research output is sizeable. Evidence to this is borne by research projects awarded by different agencies like ICSSR, DST, CSIR, GUJCOST, GSBTM to Faculty.
- ➤ India Today Institutions Rankings June 2013 has ranked HNG University at 48 in India among all institutes of higher education on basis of Reputation, Quality of academic input, Student care, Infrastructure, Job prospectus, Faculty, Research publication, Innovation and governance.
- The university's Examination Section is well-staffed and well equipped; all examinations are held on time and results published on schedule; choice-based credit system (CBCS) are in place at all levels; examination rules are reviewed timely; there is provision for review and redressal; all university results can be seen online; there is increased use of IT for evaluation, although more remains to be done in this area.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

Research of a very high quality has been promoted and sustained at HNG University since its inception. Research in any field or discipline

- at the university is conducted keeping in mind the latest developments, relevant to local, regional, national and international.
- ➤ University has taken initiative for promoting research and organized Research Marathon in three phases like Research Initiatives training workshop under which all participants from university, affiliated and constituent colleges prepared research proposals in various interdisciplinary areas and submission to different funding agencies like UGC, ICSSR, DST, CSIR, GUJCOST, GSBTM and many more.
- ➤ In all the three phases, nearly 150 participants' participated and 62 proposals were prepared for submission. HNGU in association with AIU organized one workshop "March towards the Research" on research—saw a participation of 127 people from various affiliated colleges in North Gujarat region. The efforts bore a fruit and the university has received a total of Rs. 27628347/- in the form of research grants from above mentioned funding agencies.
- ➤ University facilitates faculty member to undertake research in emerging disciplines by providing research funds (seed money). Rs. 15 lac has been disbursed amongst the faculty members from the World Class Uni. Grant (SG). Rs. 10 lac is to be disbursed amongst the Students for their research under the World Class Uni. Grant (SG). University also encourages faculties to attend National/International workshops, paper presentation, poster presentation and expenses incurred on such activities are borne by the university.
- ➤ Recently our faculty from Department of Commerce and Management, Dr. A G Modi, got prestigious Raman Fellowship (Post Doctoral) under Indo-US bilateral cooperation.
- ➤ The College Development Committee of the University is providing guidance to affiliated/constituent colleges for teaching and research innovations.
- The university has Central Instrumentation facility in the Department of Chemistry where all kinds of sophisticated equipments are available for characterization and analytical studies. Residential facilities to research scholars, research fellows are available on request. The UGC Area Study Center for Indian Diaspora and Cultural Studies is very unique and HNGU shares this honour with two or three Universities in India. The establishment of SPIPA Nodal center is another achievement on the part of HNGU
- ➤ Research Awards are given to faculty members based on Impact Factor of Research Publications. A total of 400 research papers were published in international/national journals
- ➤ HNGU faculty has published 96 books with well-known national/international publishers.
- University has a number of collaborations with prestigious universities across the world like, California State University, San Bernardino, USA, Georgia South Western State University, USA, Bio-nut Research

- Foundation, Netherlands, University of Groningen, Netherlands, United State Department of Agriculture, USA, and De Montfort University-UK, etc.
- ➤ The University has a research Committee known as Research Development Committee (RDC) which monitors and addresses issues related to research and Ph.D. programs. The University strictly follows the UGC specified minimum standards and procedures for the award of Ph. D. Degree Regulations 2009.
- A soft copy of the thesis (PDF format) is forwarded to INFLIBNET and the same PDF format in CD is forwarded to the UGC, New Delhi. University has installed research software like SPSS, Matlab, PROWESS, capitaline CL 2000, ACE Analyzer (Accord Fintech) etc. For promotion of the various research activities University is subscribing to online research sources like Proquest, DELNET, relevant journals, books, magazines, etc. discipline wise.
- Faculty members and students have not only attended national and international conferences in India and abroad but have also delivered invited/ plenary/lead lectures. University has organized a number of national and international conferences, symposia, workshops, round tables, which were attended by eminent personalities from academic as well as industry.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

- The University has an aesthetically beautiful, well planned and spacious green campus which is spread over 212 acres of land with facilities of Central library, Computer center, Hostels for Men & Women, Well developed Sport complex, VIP guest house, Health center, Canteen, Post office and Bank.
- ➤ University has a well laid 400 meter Track for athletics, separate grounds for Hockey, Football, Handball, Khokho & Kabbadi. Different courts for Volleyball, Tennis Court, Basket Ball, Badminton, Softball. The University has Gymnasium facility for students and faculties for fitness and also enclosure for Judo and Wrestling.
- ➤ University has acquired new campus of 100 acres located at Vadali Dist: Sabarkantha for further expansion and access to stake holders on even basis. The university is planning to start new faculties in Agriculture, Horticulture and Forest related studies taking into consideration the surroundings flora and fauna.
- ➤ University has developed Central Instrumental Facility CIF under UGC scheme where all sophisticated instruments are kept. All departments of university are having adequate number of computer facility with internet.

- ➤ The Health center of the university provides health services to teaching, non-teaching staff and students.
- ➤ The University Library is a spacious two-storied building (2486 sq. m.) with a capacity of 237 seats with AC Reading Hall. The facilities available in the Central Library are mentioned bellow:

As library uses SOUL for issuing books, library operations are smooth and user-friendly.

- ➤ University has very good IT Infrastructure with 10 latest configuration servers, 82 laptops and about 800 computers which are used by teaching, non teaching staff and students. University is going to establish its new WAN with 1 GBPS Bandwidth using fiber optic connectivity.
- ➤ University adequately allocates resources for upgradation, beautification and maintenance of its physical infrastructure regularly.

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

- The university provides mentoring, personal counseling, career guidance, day-care centre, remedial coaching, and training in soft skills to all students who want to avail of them.
- ➤ The GARDI Chair of the university provides coaching to students who are planning to appear in various competitive examinations of State and National level (UPSC,GPSC, Bank PO, Railways, POST, NET, SLET, and many more). These coaching classes are conducted after the regular class hours, students can join these classes by paying a nominal fee.
- The university also has a Career Counseling and Placement cell which facilitates the students to prepare themselves for more competitive world of industry and commerce requirements.
- The Career Counseling and Placement cell tries to fetch national and international companies/organizations to come to the university to interview potential recruits. Student progression figures for the university are excellent and student involvement in university activities is actively encouraged and adds much to the university's dynamic nature. Department-level student-teacher committees are active and

- students are encouraged to lest their voices and views known to university.
- ➤ Statutory bodies like the Anti-Ragging Committee and the Committee against Sexual Harassment (CASH) actively encourage student participation in their awareness programmes. SC/ST Cell, Equal Opportunity Cell works for weaker section students. There are many scholarships available for students and the university department helps and support students for getting freeships and scholarships.
- The university has an effective Alumni Association with branches spread across the globe. The differently able and visually impaired student requirements are adequately taken care of by the University.
- The university's Management club is active and organizes state level event "WISDOM" which attracts a lot of attention in the academic and student community. The university fest "Youth Festival" is organized by the university every year to encourage a spirit of self-reliance, value-system, and to impart vital lessons in teamwork and enhance organizational abilities.
- ➤ University's NSS section organizes various activities for student and social welfare in affiliated colleges of university, University's Physical education department organizes various sports competition for university students regularly for university and affiliated colleges for participation in inter, zonal and national level University sports tournaments.
- > Student's feedback is taken and analyzed for planning and developing support activity for students.

CRITERION VI:

GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

- ➤ The University's vision, mission and goals meet the objectives of higher education set by the National Knowledge Commission. The University has been providing leadership in academic and administrative matters to all affiliating colleges including colleges with Potential for Excellence. The body which acts as a bridge between the colleges and the university administration is the College Development Council (CDC). The colleges are encouraged to establish research centers, for new curriculum development tapping of the faculty expertise for Board of Studies meetings and college teachers are coopted as members on various bodies. Continuous and rigorous monitoring of selection of teachers, principals, affiliation, and conduct of examinations is done by University through statutory structures and processes.
- ➤ The University is striving to maintain high standards of teaching and research in all the Departments. This is amply evident from the quality and quantity of research publications published by the faculty.

- Nurturing and reinforcing this culture of excellence is the hallmark policy. This has been sought to be achieved through a system of recognition and rewards as well as implementing IQAC modalities.
- The University is highly aware of its obligations to society and their functional manifestations by way of contribution towards national development necessitate high quality research work. This aspect is borne by the fact that several faculty members have won assignments under one or the other prestigious fellowship programmes e.g. Raman fellowship, International Scholar Exchange Programme.
- Social values are reflected in social service activities undertaken by the University viz. Blood donation camps, campus cleanliness drive, Green campus drive, NSS camps, Voter awareness campaign, etc. As per the vision and mission statement of the University the University has evolved several strategies for enhanced Teaching-Learning, Research and Development, Community Engagement, Human resource planning and development and active interaction with Industry.
- ➤ The establishment of IQAC in 2009 has given a quantum leap in achieving excellence of the goals set. Specific measures initiated are: digitization of the Records, Enhancing e-resources, On-line admission process, Online Enrollment, Online exam form, promotion of quality research work and adoption of CBCS from 2011-12 session onwards.
- The University finances are managed primarily through the office of the Chief Account Officer. There is a meticulously planned University budget each year that is debated rigorously in the Finance Committee and Executive Council before adoption for implementation. HNGU is the only university in Gujarat which has adopted double entry system. The Local Fund Audit department is an independent audit department under the administrative control of Finance Department of the State Government which audits the accounts of university annually.
- A system of internal and external audit ensures transparency and efficiency in the University finances. Several new self financed courses have been initiated to augment resources. Other channels of resource mobilization include major/minor project proposals to various external funding agencies e.g. UGC, ICSSR, philanthropist's donation. These donations have given leverage to university in maintaining reserve and corpus funds.
- The university has initiated an innovative perspective plan for future which is named as "Chalo Gaon Chale". Aim of this plan is to initiate activities in selected villages by university departments for overall clean, green and self-sustained development.

CRITERION VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

- ➤ The University has laid special emphasis on Environmental Consciousness. The University is going to implement a Green University Policy which includes:
 - o Energy Audit of the campus,
 - o Implementation of Solar Water Heating System,
 - o Construction of Bio-methanization Plants,
 - o Green Buildings,
 - o Water Recharging,
 - o Battery operated system of locomotion on the campus,
 - Solid Waste Management system,
 - o Scientific Study of Tribal Techniques of environmental protection.
 - o Green House Protocol,
 - o Pedestrian pavements,
 - o Awareness drives for Green Campus.
 - o Establishment of Books corner
 - o Conducting Safety Inspection and audit
- ➤ The campus has been sought to be made eco-friendly with targets of saving energy and fuel. In this regard, awareness will be created by celebrating various days like the Earth Day, World Food Day, Traffic Week, National Science Day, World Aids Day, World Environment Day, National Youth Day, etc. Each of these celebrations will include some form of activity as well.
- ➤ The University has adopted several Best Practices, two of which have been selected for illustration. The *first* Best Practice is Rationalization of human resources adopting ICT procedures. The *second* Best Practice adopted is Innovative Courses, Programmes with self-support.
- The University now has many such self-financed course/programmes operational. One of the leading programmes in this regard is M.Sc (CA & IT) five years integrated and LLM two years programme. The University offers these courses in Law, Management, Computer Science, Physics, BBA, Biotechnology, Social work, Journalism, Library and Information science, Education, Physical Education, Pharmaceutical Sciences, etc
- Also initiated courses with support from UGC which fosters employability like B.Voc. (Bachelor of Vocational studies), CC (Community college), COC (Career Oriented Course), all these courses are not traditional courses and focus on employability of students.

The academic Programme developed by the University helps students to develop as citizens with knowledge, skill and character leading to social transformation and national development as per the vision and mission of the University. The university's academic environment encourages teachers to think creatively and teach in an innovative manner. There are separate and spacious buildings for each programme that are offered in the university. Most of the department in the university uses latest tools and techniques for teaching learning. Teachers and officers of the university are equipped with latest configured laptop. There are 796 computers in the university campus for use by students, teachers and non teaching staff of the university. Every department and administrative office has internet facility. Some of the departments of the university are also wi-fi enabled. The university has planned to make entire campus wi-fi. To encourage research among teachers of university departments and affiliated colleges, the university conducted workshops in three phases. The university has introduced new programmes as per industry requirements like - Post Graduate Diploma in Industrial Safety, Post Graduate Diploma in Hospital Management for government doctors, Post Graduate Diploma in Drug Discovery, Vocational Degree Courses Fashion Design & Management and also in Tourism and Hospitality Management. For female students, the Women Cell of the university regularly conduct seminars / special programs.

Yes, the university follows a systematic process in the design and development of curriculum. There is a Board of Studies for every programme offered in the university. The curriculum development process is generally done through Board of Studies. The university invites external experts from Industry, Research Organizations, and Eminent Academician and co-opts them as members of Board of Studies. Suggestions from the senior faculty members and feedback from students are also invited for the modifications/development of the curriculum. Also University Industry meets are organized by University–Industry Linkage Cell to elicit feedback from Industry

regarding curricula and their suggestions are incorporated in the syllabus. The syllabus thus prepared by the Board of Studies is approved by the Academic Council of the University which is then implemented.

Diploma in Industrial Safety Programme at Department of Life Sciences.

Innovation

The curriculum is design and developed keeping in mind the latest Innovations in the respective fields.

Research

The Curriculum is developed taking into account the current research requirement of the market and foster research attributes among the student.

The uniform curriculum would help the student for inter university transfer along with the Credit.

Also suggestions from the senior faculty members, Researcher, Academician and feedback from students are considered and discussed in the Board of Studies for the modifications/development of the curriculum. This helps the university in developing syllabus which caters to current requirement of the industry in particular and society as a whole.

Then Board of studies in respective discipline made the syllabus for the CBCS which was implemented in phased manner for first year, second year and third year in the respective bachelor degrees and the same was replicated in the master's degree programmes.

1.3.3 What are the strategies adopted for the revision of the existing programmes? What percentage of courses underwent a syllabus revision?

The University has various Academic bodies like Board of Studies, Faculties, BUTR (Board of university teaching and research) and Academic Council through which designing and revision is done.

The Board of Studies regularly reviews the need and scope of revision of syllabus as per the needs and development in the subject pertaining to Society and Industry. These Components are incorporated from time to time and are proposed for implementation.

In the year 2011 new syllabus across all the faculties was introduced as per the requirement of the Choice Based Credit system.

1.3.4 What are the value-added courses offered by the university and how does the university ensure that all students have access to them?

Following value-added courses are offered by the university: Certificate Courses in Functional & Communative English, Spoken English, Disaster Management, Yoga and Desk Top Publishing (DTP).

1.3.5 Has the university introduced any higher order skill development programmes in consonance with the national requirements as outlined by the national Skills Development Corporation and other agencies?

As far as skill development programme is concerned, the university has introduced following vocational programmes in the year 2014 under the financial assistance from UGC:

- (i) Bachelor of Vocational Degree programme (three year time duration) in the area of Fashion Design and Management
- (ii) Bachelor of Vocational Degree programme (three year time duration) in the area of Tourism and Hospitality Management
- (iii) Advance Diploma prgramme (two year time duration) in Tourism Management
- (iv) Advance Diploma prgramme (two year time duration) in Banking & Insurance
- (v) Advance Diploma prgramme (two year time duration) in Financial Services
- (vi) Advance Diploma prgramme (two year time duration) in Mobile Communication

The syllabus of above programme was designed to increase employability of candidates or the candidate can start own business also. The respective departments have tied up with several industries to ensure the objective of employability and shaping generating entrepreneurs in the region.

1.4 Feedback System

The University has formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students regarding the curriculum. The relevant Component obtained through the feedback are incorporated from time to time and are proposed for implementation.

The university-industry linkage cell organizes meetings with industry experts to get feedback on their requirement and current trend. The feedback received through this is shared with members of board of studies. Also the university co-opts the members from industry and academician from institute of repute. The board of studies meets twice in a year to discuss on various aspects of the curriculum. Seminars and workshops conducted by the university/departments provide opportunity to interact with national and international faculty on various aspects of curriculum.

1.4.3 Specify the mechanism through which affiliated institutions give feedback on curriculum enrichment and the extent to which it is made use of.

Teachers of the affiliated colleges are free to give their opinion and suggestion on curriculum enrichment to the Chairman of board of studies. Also there is a representation of affiliated college teachers in board of studies. Teachers of affiliated colleges are also helping the board members in preparation of syllabus.

The curriculum development process involves various Authorities of the University like Board of Studies, Faculties, and Academic Council to ensure Quality. The Syllabus is prepared by the Board of Studies. The Board invites experts from Industry, Research

Organization, and Eminent Academicians and co-opts them as members. Also suggestions from the senior faculty members and feedback from students are invited for the modifications/development of the curriculum. Also the University and Industry meets are organized by University –Industry Linkage Cell to elicit feedback from Industry regarding curriculums and their suggestions are incorporated in the syllabus.

- ✓ Workload is allotted as per the UGC rules.
- ✓ Time table is prepared and strictly followed as per UGC norms in all the Departments
- ✓ At department level subject wise session plans are prepared by concerned subject teachers. The session plan provides information related to syllabus, topic to be covered in particular session, list of text book and reference books, list of other related readings, information about projects to be carried out and bifurcation of weightage given to projects/ presentations /quiz/assignments/internal exams/university exam.

2.3.2 Does the university provide course outlines and course schedules prior to the commencement of the academic session? If yes, how is the effectiveness of the process ensured?

Yes, The University website contains all information that a student would require in beginning of the session. The University website also provides the contact numbers and e-mail addresses of all the faculty members so that if any requirement regarding academics arises even at odd hours students may contact the concerned person and get appropriate information. After admission the concerned syllabi, course plans and outlines and various schedules are distributed to the students. The faculty members prepare their class teaching as per the time table and display the same on the departmental notice boards. Academic council updates syllabus as per need on a regular basis. Google/Yahoo groups have been created for dissemination of notices/instructions/notes etc.

2.3.3 Does the university face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the stipulated time frame and calendar? If yes, elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional measures to overcome these.

Almost all the courses are completed on time by the University departments. Even the extra lectures are arranged during Holidays or evening/morning time as per needs.

2.3.4 How is learning made student-centric? Give a list of participatory learning activities adopted by the faculty that contributes to holistic development and improved student learning, besides facilitating life-long learning and knowledge management.

Courses are modified as per current need of industries as well as academia. Besides using Power Point Presentation and ICT based lectures, group discussions, case studies and role plays are also used. Assigning project work enables students to develop advanced skills.

For all round development, students are assigned Laboratory work / Practical exercises, Field visits, Group discussions / Seminar Assignments based on Lab work/ Fieldwork, Visit to industries / institutes, Study tour and Power-point presentations and other ICT based programmes.

The classroom lectures are supplemented with audio visual aids especially in the form of PowerPoint presentations along with traditional black board module. In addition to this web-based learning, online lectures, and popular lectures are appended by the faculty and experts from other agencies to enrich the knowledge content. Assistance is given to the students for effective presentations in seminar sessions.

2.3.5 What is the university's policy on inviting experts / people of eminence to deliver lectures and/or organize seminars for students?

Experienced and renowned visiting faculties are invited regularly to complement the permanent and guest faculty to complete the courses as well as to share their research and teaching experiences with students. For this, at the Departmental level a list of renowned persons to be invited is prepared. The list is approved by the Vice Chancellor and depending upon the slots available in the time-table, the Visiting faculty is invited. During such lectures by visiting faculties, specialized requirements are identified from the students' feedback and are used to plan for future sessions. Another round of feedback is taken as to how such sessions have improvised the overall academic quality within the students.

Subject experts are invited from all over India for enrichment of students. Online lectures are arranged with international scientists. NPTEL and other lecture series are also conducted.

2.3.6 Does the university formally encourage blended learning by using e-learning resources?

Yes, the University departments have 24x7 Internet access and are connected with high-speed broadband facility. Many of our departments have Wi-Fi facility. Students are always encouraged to take tutorials in electronic form and are also advised to refer to the Goggle Search / Scopus for appropriate Journals and review papers. Multimedia based lectures are part and parcel of almost all the Departments.

DELNET subscription is available to university departments.

E-library has been created in various science Departments, students are also shown Online lectures delivered by national as well as international experts.

2.3.7 What are the technologies and facilities such as virtual laboratories, e-learning, open educational resources and mobile education used by the faculty for effective teaching?

The following technologies and facilities are used by the faculty for effective teaching:

- The ICT based teaching-learning aids such as Multimedia projectors with latest technology are used for teaching in all Schools/Institutes.
- Well-furnished Computer Laboratories with Internet connectivity.
- An Internet connectivity of 1 Gbps under National Knowledge Network (NKN) Project of MHRD is under progress. In some of the departments Wi-Fi facility has also been made available.
- The e-resources, e-books and database are available through

- INFLIBNET-UGC-Infonet Digital Library Consortium for regular access to the faculty members of the University.
- The DELNET subscription provides access to the e-books, database and other e-learning resources to the faculty. University has membership of BRITISH LIBRARY (www.britishcouncilonline.org)
 & Bentham (http://ingentaconnect.com/content/ben). The Departments are provided with the internet connectivity to access online lectures/videos.
- A Language laboratory with full internet access has been established in the Department of English which is utilized to conduct the classes for the improvement of communication and soft skills of the students.
- Virtual labs for applied subjects like Bioinformatics are available.

2.3.8 Is there any designated group among the faculty to monitor the trends and issues regarding developments in Open Source Community and integrate its benefits in the university's educational processes?

There is no separate designated group of faculty to monitor the trends and issues regarding developments of Open Source Community in the University. However, the Department of Computer Sciences monitors the trends and issues regarding the developments in open source technologies.

Latest open source technologies are included in curricula of University wherein the courses like - PHP, JAVA, UNIIX-Linux Programming, MYSQL etc. are introduced to integrate its benefits in the University's educational processes. Informally, the Staff of various departments monitors trends and issues regarding the developments in the open source community *e.g.* Google Group, Moodle etc. — executing its benefits in the educational processes at various departments.

2.3.9 What steps has the university taken to orient traditional classrooms into 24x7 learning places?

Our Science Department labs are open to 24X7 almost throughout the year, Central library is normally open almost for 12 hours, students can pose their queries anytime by contacting the faculty on their personal numbers, and Assignments are given to students as internal evaluation strategy.

Class seminars are arranged for which students learn at home and make presentations, Soft Skill courses are offered as per need of students.

2.3.10 Is there a provision for the services of counsellors / mentors/ advisors for each class or group of students for academic, personal and psycho-social guidance? If yes, give details of the

process and the number of students who have benefitted.

The Heads/Faculties counsel the students on academic and personal problems, career opportunities and try to make them aware of their strong points and weaknesses from time to time. As such, there is no formal provision for the services of counselors/mentors/advisors for each class or group of students for academic, personal and psycho-social guidance. But university has a special chair (Smt. Vidyaben Deepchandbhai Gardi Chair) which is acting as counselors/mentors/advisors to university students helping them in the following areas:

- To Shape, sensitize and inculcate competitive approach in students
- To equip students with knowledge and skill for higher education, research, job and administrative career building.
- To stimulate entrepreneurship passion.
- To integrate existing resources for career building.
- To find new sources in inherent assets for sustainable development.

2.3.11 Were any innovative teaching approaches/methods/practices adopted/put to use by the faculty during the last four years? If yes, did they improve learning? What were the methods used to evaluate the impact of such practices? What are the efforts made by the institution in giving the faculty due recognition for innovation in teaching?

In the last five years, many teachers have developed ICT enabled course material. Such material is accessed by students using Google groups and yahoo groups. Many departments are supplied with audio visual teaching aids which are also used to teach students.

Learner centric activities like participative learning, interactive sessions, students' seminars, case studies, project work, assignments, problem solving exercises and field work are used. In most of the departments, a hierarchy is created from most senior Ph. D. scholars to the junior level master students to pass on several learning practices, experimental skills, computational skills, instrumentation training, and writing research papers, preparing posters, accessing journals/research materials, funding applications, etc. Excellent results and outputs are observed in terms of knowledge, imparting training, extension and generating revenues.

The significant teaching-innovations made in the last five years are mentioned below:

Practical work: Nearly half of the total academic work time is devoted to practical/project work aimed at creating industry like work environments.

Case method: Students are assigned live projects as case studies that

are aimed at testing the application of theoretical concepts to industry situations.

Feedback: Both teachers and students evaluate each other with the mutual enrichment so that excellence can be promoted.

Personality development initiatives: Students are divided into groups to work on projects and make classroom presentations to foster team spirit and sharing of knowledge.

2.3.12 How does the university create a culture of instilling and nurturing creativity and scientific temper among the learners?

To nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among students, various activities like debate, extempore speaking, essay competition, seminars, group discussions, symposia, poster presentations, field survey, making models and practical exercises of curriculum are conducted from time to time, Different Science day celebrations, Industrial visit for better understanding of practical approach, Motivating students for competitive examination, Inspiring students for writing scientific article is also undertaken.

2.3.13 Does the university consider student projects mandatory in the learning programme? If yes, for how many programmes have they been (percentage of total) made mandatory?

- * Number of projects executed within the university Project work for students is mandatory in many of the departments under the CBCS of the University pursuing their UG/PG programmes. Students usually undertake projects with industrial and commercial organizations. Faculties actively involve themselves in facilitating the completion of project work. The duration of the project work is either one Semester or done during summer vacation.

- * Role of faculty in facilitating such projects
 The faculty members' role is very much important; students' project work is carried out under the guidance of the faculty members. The faculty's role begins from the title finalization, and continues till the final report writing by students. Student's projects are a part of their internal evaluation in the various departments at the UG/PG level. Each student works under the supervision of a faculty member for their dissertation and other research works.

2.3.14 Does the university have a well qualified pool of human resource to meet the requirements of the curriculum? If there is a shortfall, how is it supplemented?

Yes, the university has a well qualified pool of human resources to meet the requirements of the curriculum.

The number of seats vacant in grantable departments due to state government policy, the university has taken the initiative of appointing qualified contractual staff.

For self-finance programmes, university takes care to appoint qualified staff as per the norms.

2.3.15 How are the faculty enabled to prepare computer-aided teaching/learning materials? What are the facilities available in the university for such efforts?

All the faculty members have independent computers as well as laptops with internet facilities. The facility of computer labs is available in many departments; almost all departments have LCD projectors for power point presentation. The Central Library too offers modern technological services to teachers.

E-Journal available for Faculties for research work or preparing their lecture notes:

Journal of American Chemical Society, American Institute of Physics, American Physical Society, Annual Reviews, Blackwell Publishing, Cambridge University Press, Emerald, Institute of Physics, JCCC, Oxford University Press, Project Muse, Royal Society of Chemistry, Springer Link, Taylor and Francis are made freely available to the teachers.

The library has installed LAN using SOUL software for eresources. INFLIBNET support has also been provided.

Free membership of BRITISH LIBRARY, DELNET (DELNET ONLINE), INFLIBNET CENTRE, Bentham is available to the teachers.

2.3.16 Does the university have a mechanism for the evaluation of teachers by the students / alumni? If yes, how is the evaluation feedback used to improve the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Student feedback from duly filled up by the learners is taken at the end of each year. Faculty feedback form has also been implemented recently relevant suggestions given by the students in feedback forms are incorporated by the faculty.

With the help of feedback received from the students, faculty members constantly try to make their classroom teaching effective.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 How does the university plan and manage its human resources to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum?

The teachers are required to submit Self Appraisal Report (SAR) every year. On the basis of the SAR of a teacher, his/her teaching and research performance is judged. The teachers are compulsorily required to update their knowledge through refresher / orientation courses conducted by Academic Staff Colleges. Besides, on the teachers' request they are also sent for special training programs to various International, National, State universities or

institutes. However, the SAR keeps teachers on their toes with a complete assessment of their teaching, research contribution, extension work and participation in corporate life and innovation in teaching and curriculum update.

Continuous exposure to recent trends in research, teaching is also gained by participation in national and international seminars / conferences.

Faculty members of all departments are required not only to participate in conferences / seminars but also organize seminars / conferences during which they get ample exposure and knowledge of new trends and changes.

University has started new programs viz. Department of Hospital Management, Vocational programs (B.Voc), Community College (Advance Diploma), Career Oriented courses (Advance Diploma), Post Graduate diploma in Industrial Safety.

While introducing a new program, university keeps in mind the teaching requirements and appointments are made following the UGC guidelines.

To attract the suitable candidates, the advertisements are published in National level newspapers and put on the website of the university.

After receiving the applications further processing is done and the selection committee is formed.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the university ensure that all the stakeholders are aware of the evaluation processes that are in place?

Seminars are organized for teaching and non-teaching staff to make them aware about CBCS system and other online reforms which the university has introduced in recent times, Students are made aware of these reforms by their teachers.

2.5.2 What are the important examination reforms initiated by the university and to what extent have they been implemented in the university departments and affiliated colleges? Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the examination management system

Answer books from the examination centers are collected in the Central Assessment centers and are mixed and grouped by making bundles of 30 answer books each. The instructions regarding assessment of answer books are given to the examiners and moderators.

The university also follows the below mentioned measures in order to ensure the confidentiality of the evaluation system:

- Bar-coding of answer sheets which ensures confidentiality of the process
- Online generation of exam hall ticket at university departments and colleges
- Full computerization of all result related work
- Availability of all exam related circulars and results on university website.

2.5.3 What is the average time taken by the University for Declaration of examination results? In case of delay, what measures have been taken to address them? Indicate the mode / media adopted by the University for the Ublication of examination results (e.g. website, SMS, email, etc.).

The university at declaring examination results within 30 days or latest by 45 days from the date of last paper of any examination. However, owing to shortage of hands and inadequate number of approved teaching faculty for certain courses, the University faces hardships in completing this task within stipulated time. Due to constraints like non availability of examiners and inadequate staff the results of certain courses are delayed. However the university ensures to declare results within 60 days.

The examination results are declared on university website and mark sheets are distributed within 3 to 7 working days.

2.5.4 How does the university ensure transparency in the evaluation process? What are the rigorous features introduced by the university to ensure confidentiality?

Bar-coding of answer sheets have been introduced in certain courses, Centralized assessment process is in place to maintain the confidentiality of the whole process, central assessment with center under CCTV surveillance. Online results and mark sheets are made available to student before they get result from their respective departments/ colleges.

2.5.5 Does the university have an integrated examination platform for the following processes?

* Pre-examination processes – Time table generation, OMR, student list generation, invigilators, squads, attendance sheet, online payment gateway, etc.

2.5.6 Has the university introduced any reforms in its Ph.D. evaluation process?

Yes, the University is following the UGC rules for admission to Ph.D. programmes and has introduced Pre-Eligibility Test (PET) as written examination, followed by interview as per UGC regulations 2009. Course work is also conducted as per UGC regulations 2009.

The panel of refrees for the evaluation of Ph. D. thesis consists of two refrees one from within the state and the other from outside the state. Open viva voce is conducted in which the candidate defends the research work done by him/her.

2.5.7 Has the university created any provision for including the name of the college in the degree certificate?

Yes, the university assigns unique code to each college. The name of the college is printed in the mark sheets and also in the degree certificate.

2.5.8 What is the mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to examinations?

The students' grievance redressal process becomes operational

from onset of examination process even after the results are out. While time table of the examinations are hosted or published, if for any reason it clashes with some other National level examination or falls on holidays, the administration sympathetically looks into the requests and changes the dates. During examination if students complain that the questions are out of syllabus, the Examination Committee immediately addresses the issue. In case of any serious discrepancy noted at any stage of examination, a decision is taken on the conduct of re-examination of the paper concerned. A student gets to see his/her answer scripts if so desired, rechecking and reassessment of answer sheet is also done if a student desires the same.

2.5.9 What efforts have been made by the university to streamline the operations at the Office of the Controller of Examinations? Mention any significant efforts which have improved the process and functioning of the examination division/section.

Examination Section has adequate infrastructure for smooth functioning. The Controller of Examinations and staff have spacious rooms and state-of-the-art facilities like high configuration computers, power inverters, FAX, photo-copiers, hi-speed (fiber optic cable based) internet, so that important functions remain operational throughout the year. A noteworthy feature which has been added recently is the construction of a building called Result Centre which also serves as Central Assessment Centre.

The affiliated colleges submit the results of the continuous comprehensive evaluation (internal tests, seminar, project work and practical marks) online/through electronic means.

2.6. Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Has the university articulated its graduate attributes? If so, how does it facilitate and monitor its implementation and outcome?

While designing a course, care has been taken to explicitly state the learning objectives for all the papers covered in a particular course/programme. Duly considered BOS supported with academic experts and participation of industry/trade/commerce/NGO experts help in identifying the attributes and learning objectives.

2.6.2 Does the university have clearly stated learning outcomes for its academic programmes/departments? If yes, give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

The basic objective of academic programs is employability,

entrepreneurship development, development of self confidence and enhancing intellectual faculties and researchers. Taking into consideration these objectives, the university has framed its curriculum of various programs. The teachers and students are also aware of their goals and try their level best to achieve their goals through their regular teaching, learning and evaluation process.

2.6.3 How are the university's teaching, learning and assessment strategies structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

A compulsory component of internal assessment of 30% weightage based on class tests has been introduced for better and continuous participation of students under the semester system.

Presentation of seminar papers is made a component of PG Programmes which enhances the knowledge level of the students and gives them necessary confidence and the ability to logically argue.

Study tours/industrial visits are organized regularly to give the students first hand experience of the newly developed technologies in their respective fields and to enhance their career opportunities.

A lot of laboratory experiments are conducted in order to give basic knowledge of various science subjects.

In addition to the traditional teaching, most faculty members use innovative teaching methods such as ICT enabled teaching aids.

The faculty members of the University and affiliated colleges have been encouraged to participate and/or organize seminars, conferences, workshops, refresher and orientation courses as well as to present research papers so as to keep pace with the recent developments in their subject area.

The faculty members and students have access to books, journals and electronic resources.

The coaching classes for NET/SET are conducted regularly through the Coaching Scheme of the UGC for SC/ST/OBC (Non-Creamy Layer) and Minorities to impart NET/SET guidance to the students.

The Remedial Coaching classes for SC/ST/OBC (non-creamy layer) and Minorities is being conducted regularly.

Smt. Vidyaben Deepchandbhai Gardi Chair/SPIPA center in the University is regularly conducting training programmes to impart training and guidance to all students aspiring for career in Civil Services and other competitive exams.

2.6.4 How does the university collect and analyse data on student learning outcomes and use it to overcome the barriers to learning?

The continuous evaluation (Internal Assessment) and the results of end semester examinations are the indicators to review the

student's outcome at the end of learning process.

The University collects the data and analyses student learning outcomes through: Internal Assessments – Class Tests, Assignments and Class Room Presentations.

The performance of the students at the end semester examinations are analyzed and discussed and the necessary steps like – organization of extra classes, remedial coaching and more assignments are given to the students to overcome the obstacles in learning.

2.6.5 What are the new technologies deployed by the university in enhancing student learning and evaluation and how does it seek to meet fresh/ future challenges?

The following technologies have been deployed during last few years for enhancing students learning and evaluation:

Establishment of Campus-wide Area Network with Internet connectivity of 1 Gbps under NKN (National Knowledge Network) Project of MHRD for e-resource access is under process

Free access to e-journals, databases and other online resources through INFLIBNET UGC-Infonet Digital LibraryConsortium.

Smart-classrooms in each Department equipped with LCD projector, other accessories.

Computer Laboratories with Internet connectivity to the students in Few of our departments.

Desk-top computers/lap tops, printer, scanner with Internet connectivity have been provided to each faculty.

Establishment of language laboratory in the Department of English is an important step in providing ICT-enabled platform to the students to improve their communication skills, group discussion practices, and phonetics.

The university has procured special softwares such as – MATLAB, PROWESS, Capitaline, and many others.

Any other information regarding Teaching, Learning and Evaluation which the university would like to include.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

3.1 Promotion of Research

3.1.1 Does the university have a Research Committee to monitor and address issues related to research? If yes, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations which have been implemented and their impact.

The University has a statutory body known as BUTR which monitors and addresses issues related to research and Ph. D. program.

Ph. D. Screening Committee consists of

- Dean of the concerned faculty (Convener)
- Chairman of Board of Studies of the subject concerned
- Head of the Department concerned,
- Ph. D. guides of the subject concerned (not more than three, nominated by the Vice Chancellor),
- Not more than two Subject Expert from other University, nominated by the Vice Chancellor.
- The University strictly follows UGC specified minimum standards and procedures for the award of Ph. D. degree, Regulation 2009.

Candidates having cleared the written entrance test (First and second sections) will be required to take an oral viva-voce of 100 marks conducted by the concerned university department. It will be compulsory for all candidates (including the candidates who have cleared Net/Set etc. or passed M.Phil. with entrance tests after 2009) to take oral viva-voce and clear the same ,separately, with a minimum of 40% marks.

For allotment of students and identifying proper guides (depending upon the expertise of the guides and areas of interest of students) there is four member committee chaired by the heads of the university departments of the concerned subjects. Decision of the committee shall be final in this matter.

A soft copy of the thesis (PDF format) must be forwarded to INFLIBNET and the same PDF format in CD must be forwarded to the UGC New Delhi. If the language used in the thesis is other than English, a summary in English must be submitted along with the thesis and the same must be forwarded to the INFLIBNET and UGC.

On recommendation of the Board of University Teaching and Research (BUTR), the Executive Council shall appoint a panel of three Examiners, one of whom shall be an internal referee; the University teacher guiding the candidate's work, and the other two must be external ones, i.e. from outside the Gujarat state. For this purpose the Board of University Teaching and Research shall recommend a panel

of at least 7 (seven) names of examiners in the subject besides the guide (s).

University has installed research software like SPSS, Matlab, PROWESS, capitaline CL 2000, ACE Analyzer (Accord Fintech) etc. and has subscribed online research sources like Proquest, DELNET, etc. Various journals, books, magazines, etc. are also procured routinely to promote the research activities of University.

International and national level conferences have been organized at regular intervals to share the research knowledge with outside world.

Research Methodology Workshops, Case Writing Workshops, Seminars and FDPs for faculty members and Research Paper Presentation are organized in the University at regular intervals.

Faculty members of the university participate regularly in various national and international seminars and conferences as resource persons/delegates.

3.1.1 What is the policy of the university to promote research in its affiliated / constituent colleges?

University has conducted one initiative for promoting research under which university has organized Research Marathon in three phases like Research Initiatives Phase-I, II, III Workshop under which all participant from university ,affiliated and constituent colleges have prepared research proposals in various interdisciplinary areas and submitted to different funding agencies like UGC, ICSSR, DSTs, CSIR, GUJCOST, GSBTM and many more.

Details of research marathon are mentioned below:

- 1. 1st phase of research marathon was conducted on 21st Oct 2010, in which 46 participants participated.
- 2. 2nd phase of research marathon was conducted on 10-12 Jan 2011, in which 66 participants participated and 62 proposals were prepared.
- 3. 3rd phase of research marathon was conducted on 5th July 2011, in which 35 participants participated.
- 4. Again in association with AIU one workshop "*March towards the Research*" on research was conducted from 21-24 Nov 2011 were 127 participants from various affiliated colleges who attended it.

3.1.2 What are the proactive mechanisms adopted by the university to facilitate the smooth implementation of research schemes/ projects?

University facilitates faculty member to undertake research in emerging disciplines by providing research funds (seed money). Rs. 15 lac disbursed amongst the faculty members in World Class Uni. Grant (SG)

Adequate attention is paid to proposal preparation and their submission to relevant funding agency. All proposals are channelized and forwarded through registrar office.

As soon as the proposals are accepted and university is informed about sectioning the grant amount, the CAO takes care to see that the research grant is released to the PI as quickly as possible.

The audit section informs PI & Co-PI about maintaining Heads of allotted grants and timely submission of progress report. On final completion of the project, the report is submitted to funding agency with utilization certificate.

3.1.3 How is interdisciplinary research promoted?

University departments are associated with various prestigious organizations for our research projects like

University has always ensured to create / enhance infrastructure to promote good teaching – learning environment.

The university has taken several initiatives to promote good teaching learning environment which are as follows:

- (i) Construction of state of art departmental building for Master of Hospital Management Programme.
- (ii) Construction of state of art departmental building for Bachelor degree in Architecture Programme.
- (iii) Construction of additional hostels for boys and girls. Total two more hostels for boys and one more hostel for girls have been constructed by the university. This enables students to stay on the campus and save their time and energy which can be used for improving their knowledge and learning.
- (iv) Construction of Convention Hall which comprises of three different auditorium halls having capacity of 800, 350 and 150 persons respectively. The university already has two other auditorium, Kilachand Rangbhavan and Gandhi Smruti hall which have capacity of 450 and 200 persons respectively. As a result of which the university is now well equipped to organize all their programmes like seminars/conferences, youth festival, cultural programmes of the university as well as of the affiliated colleges. Some schools of Patan city are also organizing their cultural programme in the university auditorium hall. These halls are utilised by government agencies like Election commission, DDO office, office of the

Collector, and such other for the purpose of meeting or their awareness programme for the benefit of the ordinary citizens.

For every faculty appropriate and suitable environment is basic need so that they can improve their performance in academic field and in research. The occupancy generally remains full in all the hostels. Since the TDS level in the water in this region is much above WHO prescribed standard, the university has installed RO plant in each hostel to provide better quality water to all hostel students. The university has also provided geyser facility in the hostel.

There are no recreational facilities at present in the hostels for students. But, students of the hostel can access gymnasium and yoga centre facilities in the university at any time. Entry to gymnasium and yoga centre for university hostel students is free. The university is planning to install television sets in all hostels. 


The Library remains close on 26th Jan, 15th Aug, and 2nd Oct.

There is adequate sign boards present in the library; fire extinguishers are also kept in the library building.












GRAPH- Library books to students




Average number of books added during the last four years

The computer centre of the university regularly previews existing computer infrastructure and suggest, if required, the upgradation of IT infrastructure and associated facilities. Also, The university departments and administrative section put up their proposal for upgradation and other IT related requirements to the computer centre of the university. The system analyst of the university then starts

the process of procurement and installation of the same.

Teachers of some departments provide information regarding online resources to students. The Department of management has subscribed to the following database/packages for students and teachers:

- (i) PROWESS: It is the database of financial performance of over 27000 companies. It also provides news and other related information about these companies.
- (ii) ACE Analyzer (Ace Equity): It is a database application which gives a comprehensive and analytical statistics for company information with user friendly navigation. It also provides news and other related information of various industries and companies.
- (iii) Capitaline (CL2000): It provide financial and non-financial digital database of more than 26,000 Indian companies, classified under more than 300 industries, with analytical tool.

The above database/ application are available to faculty/students and researcher of the university.

4.3.5 What are the new technologies deployed by the university in enhancing student learning and evaluation during the last four years and how do they meet new / future challenges?

The university is exploring possibilities of using latest computing technology to enhance students' learning and evaluation. Barcode stickers are also used on trial basis in B.Sc. programme.

The faculties of the university are using technology and preparing power point slides, pdf files, word files etc for dissemination of knowledge. It is also provided to students through mail so that students can use it to enhance their learning. Use of multimedia projector is also there in every department. Students are also shown subject/ topic related short films on multimedia whenever required.

4.3.6 What are the IT facilities available to individual teachers for effective teaching and quality research?

The university has provided separate cabin to every teacher. Every teacher in the university has a desktop/laptop or both along with printing and high speed internet facility in the department. Class rooms are equipped with wi-fi/wired multimedia projectors for effective teaching. IT related complaints of the teacher is immediately attended

to by the computer centre of the university. E-Journals/database is also accessible from the table of the teachers.

4.3.7 Give details of ICT-enabled classrooms/learning spaces available within the university? How are they utilized for enhancing the quality of teaching and learning?

Most of the class rooms in the university are equipped with multimedia projector. Internet facility is also available in the classroom / laboratory in some departments of the university. The auditorium of the university "Rangbhavan" is also equipped with multimedia. The university has initiated the process to make entire campus wi-fi.

4.3.8 How are the faculty assisted in preparing computer- aided teaching-learning materials? What are the facilities available in the university for such initiatives?

All teachers are given computer/printer/internet facility to prepare teaching-learning material. In the year 2013-14 university has conducted two workshops in collaboration with Microsoft for teaching and non-teaching staff of the university.

4.3.9 How are the computers and their accessories maintained?

The computer centre of the university is responsible for maintenance of computers and its accessories. It has trained manpower. The university has also given annual maintenance contract, by inviting tender, for maintenance, repairing and supply of computer and accessories. The centre purchases new one in case the part / accessories is not repairable. It also up-gradaes hardware/software as and when required or on the recommendation of academic/administrative department.

Yes, the university is connected to NKN under NMEICT.

Teachers and students of the university are using web resources like Wikipedia, dictionary etc. Teachers are aware of the limitations of these e-resources and they also inform students about it and ensure that other reference material is used. The teachers, students and researchers are encouraged to use other online reference, e-journals and database, available through university website. The university has membership

of British Library, DELNET, Inflibnet and Bentham and teachers, students and researchers are encouraged to access these resources online.

The university has separate budget head for update, deployment and maintenance of computers in the entire university. The university every year gives AMC through tender to an outside agency for maintenance of computers and peripherals in university.

Presently no plan is made for open environment system.

4.4 Maintenance of Campus Facilities

4.4.1 Does the university have an estate office / designated officer for overseeing the maintenance of buildings, class-rooms and laboratories? If yes, mention a few campus specific initiatives undertaken to improve the physical ambience.

Yes, the university has estate office and has appointed full time Dy. Executive Engineer and Assistant Engineer to look after the maintenance of building, class rooms, laboratories and other physical facilities. The university has taken following initiatives to improve physical ambience:

- (i) Silver Jubilee Park in the campus.
- (ii) Pond with walk path.
- (iii) Landscaping, development of grass-lawn and plantation alongside every department.
- (iv) Internal beautification of every department by providing various plants.
- (v) Maintenance of these facilities is outsourced by the university.

4.4.2 How are the infrastructure facilities, services and equipments maintained? Give details.

The estate department of the university is responsible for maintenance of electric power, plumbing, and mechanical items, furniture and fixtures. The university has recruited electrician-1, motor-man-1, plumber-1, carpenter-1 and helper-3 for maintaining infrastructure facilities. Technical staffs (lab technician) are employed for maintenance of laboratory in chemistry, life science and bio-

technology department. The university has also recruited one technical officer and technical assistant in the central instrument laboratory for maintenance of instruments. In case of major fault in the instrument, the university calls service engineer of the company.

For maintenance of landscaping, grass-lawn, university has hired gardeners through an agency. Security personnel are hired through security agency. For sanitation and cleaning of departmental buildings, hostel buildings, auditorium and guesthouse, teaching and non-teaching quarters, road and other infrastructure sweepers are also hired through an agency.

Maintenance of computers and other IT facilities is done by the computer centre. Annual Maintenance Contract is given not only for computer and accessories but also for ACs and RO plants.

Complaints are registered at the computer centre in cases of breakdown and malfunctioning of computers and accessories and with estate department in all other cases.

Any other information regarding Infrastructure and Learning Resources which the university would like to include.

Many time the university auditoriums are used by other affiliated colleges and schools of surrounding areas, government and semi government agencies for educational, cultural and other activities.

The lush green campus of the university is often visited by the students of various schools of north Gujarat region.

Apart from the university library, few other departments of the university have departmental library. Department of Commerce and Management, Department of Computer Science, Department of Hospital Management and S. K. College of Business Management are having their own library. The university library / departmental library is also accepting donation in form of books.

The library of Commerce and Management department has received more than 850 books as donation from Dr. B. A. Prajapati on various management subjects' worth about Rs.2.60 lakhs. The department has specially created a place in the library known as 'Dr. B. A. Prajapati Books Corner'.

The reading room of the library is used by the people of Patan for reading, journals, newspapers and magazines. Not only students but also senior citizens attend the weekly "Budhavariya" meeting.

- Academic Support and Mentoring is provided for each program which ensures academic inputs needed by students and mentor students.

- > Student Welfare Schemes: Student welfare schemes (scholarships) are available to reserved categories students.
- ➤ Class for different competitive exams (Free of cost for reserved categories, career counseling, soft skill development, etc are available to the students. Student participation in co-curricular and extracurricular activities is encouraged.
- ➤ The university has a career counseling and placement cell which helps to identify job opportunities and grooms students for industry.
- The university has an equal opportunity cell & CASH (Committee against sexual harassment), SC/ST Cell.
- The university has a mechanism for timely redressal of student grievances. The university has gymnasium for students thus encouraging them to stay fit physically.
- ➤ University Campus has suvidha Kendra which has the following facilities for students:

Free Cyber café to university students, many departments have Wi-fi enabled buildings which provides free access to the students.

- Motivational mentoring through University Funds and Donations
 - Gold Medals are provided to the university toppers of all subjects.

5.1.2 Apart from classroom interaction, what are the provisions available for academic mentoring?

Academic mentoring is provided to students by a system of faculty program coordinators. Students are also mentored by faculty mentors for summer training projects, major research projects etc. Students, as part of internal assessment, are required to give Seminar presentations which they prepare under the guidance of faculty mentors. The continuous evaluation scheme of institute also ensures continuous academic mentoring.

Apart from classroom teaching, in every department remedial classes are organized under the UGC remedial classes scheme. UGC remedial classes are centrally coordinated by the coordinator and weaker students and students of SC/ST categories are mentored by the departmental faculties as well as sometimes the guest faculties as experts.

Moreover students are also sent for field work, industrial training, internship in NGOs, hospitals and concerned organizations for their academic and professional enhancement through the university.

5.1.3 Does the University have any personal enhancement and development scheme such as career counseling, soft skill development, career-path-identification, and orientation to well-being for its students? Give the detail of such schemes.

Yes, as mentioned above, the University has initiated some futuristic schemes for development of students.

- 1. The Programs of National Skills Development Certification (NSDC) in association with Government of India has been launched, which benefits the students of all programmes. The program is to empower the students with basic skills, so that he/she gets more exposure in the market.
- 2. Soft Skill Development: The university has implemented choice based credit system (CBCS) system at UG and PG level for regular assessment of the students. The assessment gives equal weightage to the written, verbal and presentation skills, which is assessed by regular presentations, seminars, assignments and internal test of the students. This process helps to identify slow learning students from the advanced learning students. The advanced learners are given opportunities to present their research work in various national and

international conferences and are also given platform to conduct market survey and research relating to corporate and social topics.

- 3. The Gardi Chair frequently organizing courses for personality development, communication and leadership development at a nominal cost for all university students.
- 4. The University conducts NET/SET Coaching and Remedial Coaching classes through Gardi Chair on regular basis.
- 5. The University has SPIPA nodal center for IAS/IPS residential coaching for students.
- 6. The Equal Opportunities Cell organizes Spoken English, Personality Development, and Soft Skills Workshops for SC/ST students on the campus every year.
- 7. Career Counseling Cell is formulating such courses especially for the students of PG departments.

5.1.4 Does the university provide assistance students for obtaining educational loans from banks and other financial institutions?

On campus branch of State bank of India offers zero balance account opening to all the university students and the heads of all departments help the students in their efforts.

Few departments, like department of computer science, department of commerce and management are assisting students for obtaining bank loans especially for purchase of personal computers, laptops and for abroad visits.

- Department of life sciences organizes camps for Health checkup, Thellasemia, HIV, etc and other health related tests free of costs.
- Skill development (spoken English, Computer literacy, etc.): Gardi chair and Career Counseling Cell of the university frequently organizes skill development programmes for the university students
- Cyber café in the central library is available at free of cost for university student.
- Performance enhancement for slow learners: UGC remedial classes scheme launched from last academic year which assists the slow learners.
- Some departments organize weekly test and improvement programmes for slow learners.
- Exposure of students to other institutions of higher learning/corporate/ business houses, etc.
- Publication of student magazines: University library publishes its quarterly magazine "Uttara" for students.
- Apart from these, University departments like, Architecture, Life Sciences, Computer Science, etc publish their own e news letters, e journals for the concerned subjects.

Yes, recently the Nodal centre of SPIPA (Sardar Patel Institute of Public Administration, Gov. of Gujarat) has been established in the university which facilitates residential coaching to selected aspirants for IBPS and SSC.

The University has established Gardi Chair through the financial support from the kind Donor, Shri Deep Chand Gardi. The chair provides guidance and coaching classes for students for such competitive exams like Bank PO, TAT (Teaching Aptitude Test), Talati, Clerk, Railways Exam, Clerical Exam, GPSC, etc.

NET/SLET coaching is conducted regularly for the students.

The University encourages the students to participate in various sports/extracurricular activities. The policies of the University for enhancing students' participation in sports and extracurricular activities are given below:

Additional academic support and academic flexibility in examinations.

The students who are participating in sports and extracurricular activities are given special attention by the faculty. The laboratory work of such students is adjusted accordingly with the next batch and internal tests, if missed due to sports and extracurricular activities are also adjusted. Under the policy of Academic Flexibility, grace marks are given as a motivational measure to all students participating at AIU recognized National/International Sports events. The students participating in sports activities are also given grace marks in final results.

Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials:

The University offers sports uniforms, sport kits and other materials for team members. It also provides TA/DA @ of Rs.250 per day for students and Rs. 400, per day for coach & manager during competitions/tournaments.

The Department of Sports organizes sports training/conditioning camps of various sporting events at University Sports Complex. Special diet like - high energy breakfast and quality lunch and dinner are provided during the camps.

The University provides psychological counseling for the motivation and better performance of athletes.

University has a Career counseling and a development cell under UGC scheme. The focus and objectives of cell are mentioned below:

The teaching faculty also interacts with the parents whenever the parents meet the teachers and the suggestions provided by the parents are taken into consideration while formulating the future mission of the university.

The University invites contribution of endowment funds from stakeholders which with which the university organizes special lectures series (to inculcate social responsibility and human values), meets expenses for the gold medals (to motivate meritorious students)etc. Retired teachers, eminent educationists, scientists are regularly invited to deliver lectures and interact with the students closely.

The Vice-Chancellor is the Head of the Institution. He is assisted by the Registrar, Controller of Examinations, and Deans of all different Faculties in all academic and administrative matters. The Executive Council is the supreme body of university, there are other bodies like Academic council, Senate, planning board, Board of university teaching and research (BUTR). As the chairperson of these bodies, the Vice-Chancellor ensures the smooth functioning of the university in the development of management system, implementation of policies framed and for continuous improvement.

As Chairperson of the Board of Studies and Board of Examinations, the Head of the department plays a leadership role in curriculum development and evaluation. This process ensures involvement of leadership at all levels, as per the statutory provisions of the university.

• in interacting with its stakeholders?

The University leadership interacts with all the stakeholders, viz. the students, parents, alumni, faculty, support staff, industry, and the community.

Interaction with the students begins from the time of admission and continues up to placement. In fact, the relationship continues even after the students leave the university through alumni associations. All the faculty and Head of the department are easily approachable by the students. All the students, faculty and non-teaching staff can meet with the Administrator every day at fixed time slots to discuss any academic matters or for grievance redressal. The management interacts with the parents during admission and whenever the parents seek an audience. The University fosters a strong interaction with the Industry by including industrialists in the Boards of Studies; university has constituted Academy-Industry linkage cell on the campus.

• in reinforcing a culture of excellence?

The University has conducted initiatives for promoting research culture like Research Marathon which was conducted in three phases: Phase-I, II, III Workshop under which all participants from university departments and affiliated colleges prepared research proposals in various interdisciplinary areas and submitted the same to different funding agencies

In view of the above, the faculty and the administrative authorities identify the needs of the University through various meetings and delegations. The authorities strive to fulfill the needs of the University. The short-term and long-term plans are designed and complied with the physical and financial supports.

Other bodies are also conglomeration of various sections of

people as per the requirement of the body.

As per Section-16 university court is governed by Class-I Ex-Officio Members, University Officers, The Chancellor, The Last Vice-Chancellor, The Pro-Vice-Chancellor, The University Librarian, The Director of Higher Education, The Director of Technical Education, The Director of Health And Medical Services And Medical Education, The Chairman of Gujarat Secondary Education Board, Gujarat State, The Director of Employment And Training, Heads of University Departments, Class-II Ordinary Members, One member representative from Secondary school Teachers, Two Members from the Gujarat Legislative Assembly.








The university's internal organizational structure is given below:

There are others sections UGC section, Sports section, NSS section. Each section is organised by Section in charge (SO) who is supposed to report to concerned assistant registrar. Then in the hierarchy, there is the deputy registrar, registrar, PVC. The Vice chancellor is at the top of the hierarchy and is the final signing authority.

All important/ strategic decisions are taken in the EC and VC/PVC is the signing authority.

Routine decisions pertaining to day to day activities of the university are taken and executed by the administrative wing of the university which consists of Registrar, Deputy Registrar, Assistant registrar, Office Superintendent.

• To Ensure the effective functioning of various sections monthly/ quarterly/ half yearly table audits are conducted. During ISO certification process, a person was appointed and various teams were formed which also conducted inspection of various sections

At regular intervals the duties assigned are reviewed in the staff meetings.

Regarding financial matters, for day to day activities department heads are given sufficient autonomy as per Ordinance 22. For policy issues and big expenditures university guidelines are followed.

• A grievances cell has been constituted by the university which takes care of the grievances of the staff members of the university.

- Enquiries were conducted wherever required and the outcome of enquiry was communicated to the concerned faculty.
- Moreover, respective sections take due care in redressing grievances and tries to resolve the same as quickly as possible. Monitoring of grievances is done by Head/ Sectional head.
- Student grievances mechanism: Each department has a complaint box and a complaint register where student can register their grievances. The complaints that are received are resolved by respective Heads of the departments.

Yes, combined feedbacks are taken from students and the analysed outcome is sent to respective departments.

The outcome is distributed to all faculties in staff meetings. It is ensured in staff meetings that all issues raised by the students shall be incorporated in the future planning of the university.

YES, the university follows the ISO 9001: 2008 certification to conduct the performance auditing of its departments.

According to the requirement of standards Quality Policy, Quality Management System was created by ISO cell. On May 9, 2012 first Internal Audit was done and final audit was done on May 15, 2012. Based on final audit University has been awarded ISO 9001: 2008 certificate on July 23, 2012. Citizen charter was released on September 28, 2012.

Office manual revision workshop was arranged by ISO cell during April 12-13, 2012.

The various bodies of the university namely Board of Studies, Academic Council and Executive Council and Finance Committee are reviewing process of university time to time.

The University achieved 48th rank in all India ranking.



IQAC conducts internal audit regularly for university departments.

6.2.9 What mechanisms have been evolved by the university to identify the developmental needs of its affiliated institutions?

Creation of the University - College resource planning (URP) system jointly created with financial support from college and university. This included Computerization and atomization of processes, starting from the Admission, Enrolment, Examination, Electoral and other information management between College and University. Dynamic portal was created for collection of the input from the various faculties regarding their academic progress. ISO cell also initiated online registry in Inward section free of cost with collaboration of NIC India.

As and when applications of affiliated institutions are received by the University, the same is sent to various bodies/ boards of university keeping in mind the priority and the importance to be given to the needs and demands. The final signing authority is VC on the behalf of EC.

Most of boards/ Bodies of university have representatives of affiliated institutions/ colleges so that their needs get represented in the university. The university also conducts the surprise visit of colleges is also organized.

6.2.10 Does the university have a vibrant College Development Council (CDC) / Board of College and University Development (BCUD)? If yes, detail its structure, functions and achievements.

Yes, the university has a vibrant College Development Council (CDC) / Board of College and University Development (BCUD) as per the university Statute – 196

The college development comittee Ensures the proper planning and integrated development of affiliated colleges and provides the colleges necessary help and guidance in their development. It serves as a link between the University; the University Grants Commission, the State Education Department and the affiliated colleges.

The College Development Committee consists of the following Members;

- (a) Vice-Chancellor (Ex-Officio) Chairman
- (b) The registrar (Ex-Officio) Secretary
- (c) One Dean from the Deans of the Faculties of arts, Science, Commerce by rotation to be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor.
- (d) One member of the Executive Council from amongst the members themselves, nominated by the Executive Council.
- (e) One member of the Academic Council to be nominated by the Executive Council.

- (f) One principal of an affiliated College to be nominated by the Executive Council from the Court.
- (g) One teacher from the University Department to be nominated by the Executive Council from the Court.
- (h) One representative of the Management of affiliated Colleges to be nominated by the Executive Council from the Court.
- (i) One teacher of the affiliated Colleges to be nominated by the Executive Council from the Court.
- (j) One representative of students to be nominated by the Executive Council from the University Court.
- (k) Such other members as may be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor subject to the condition that the total number of the member of the committee shall not exceed 15.

The terms of the office of the members other than Ex-Officio members of the Committee shall be three years. Provided that a member who is nominated on the Committee shall cease to be a member of the Committee if and when he ceases to hold the office by virtue of which he was nominated. In view of casual vacancy, the vacancy shall be filled in by nomination by the Vice-Chancellor for the unexpired portion of the term.

- (3) The College Development Committee shall meet at regular intervals at least twice in an academic year, on a date to be fixed by the Vice-Chancellor.
- (4) Following shall be the functions of the College Development Committee.
- (a) The College Development Committee shall be deliberative body.
- (b) It will make suggestions to the University on issues pertaining to the development of affiliated Colleges.
- (c) It will suggest strategies to benefit from various schemes of assistance of the University Grants Commission meant for affiliated Colleges.
- (d) It will suggest measures for improvement of standards of instruction and examination in affiliated colleges.
- (5) The Vice-Chancellor, and in his absence a member elected by the Committee shall preside over the meetings of the Committee.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What efforts have been made to enhance the professional development of teaching and non-teaching staff?

Professional development of teaching staff is enhanced by organising/ attending seminars, conferences, workshop, Refresher and orientation courses. As per university policy all teaching faculty is

allowed to attend any of such activity two times a year. All faculty members are encouraged to present their research proposals and the university provides necessary support to them.

For non teaching staff members two workshops were organised on RTI Act, many staff members were sent for computer trainings. Workshops were also conducted for record keeping in coordination with SPIPA. ISO training was also conducted for both teaching and nonteaching faculty members.

6.3.2 What is the outcome of the review of various appraisal methods used by the university? List the important decisions.

The university has a self-appraisal system to evaluate the performance of its faculty as per Government norms. Each faculty member is required to submit a self-appraisal report annually on the basis of the parameters like - teaching hours, subjects taught, research papers/articles/books published, conferences attended, presented in the conferences, new curricula designed/developed, participation in extracurricular /cocurricular activities, responsibilities assigned by the university, and other contributions made towards the society. The self-appraisal reports of the teaching staff, duly verified by the Directors/ Heads of respective Schools/Institute are evaluated by the Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor.

As per Sixth Pay Commission, for all the appointments of Teachers/Librarian/ Directors of Physical Education and Career Advancement Promotions, the Academic Performance Indicators (API) are made mandatory.

6.3.3 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have benefitted from these schemes in the last four years? Give details.

The following welfare schemes are available for the teaching and non-teaching staffs of the University:

The Karamchari Kalyan Trust is managed by university non teaching staff, which provides various facilitations to employees like - Teaching and nonteaching Rs 25000/ are given for any treatment (Related to health).

Vehicle loans are easily made available to all staff members at a low interest rates.

Provides loan for the purchase of computer/laptop at 0 % interest.

Provides medical treatment/facilities at concessional rates through the Health Center of the University.

Provides festival advance to Class-III and Class-IV employees every year.

Zero tuition fees for the wards of the employees for getting

admission in the Self financed course of University Schools/Institute.

Pension Scheme and Defined Pension Scheme for employees in the service of the University before and after 2005, respectively.

Leave Travel Concession (LTC) benefit is available to the employees of the University.

Sports complex and its resources like gymnasium are available to all employees.

Travel and accommodation allowance for attending workshops/seminars knowledge enhancement is available to employees.

The facility of **Day Care Centre** is available for the wards of female employees of the University.

The Maternity Leave of 180 days is given to the female employees and 15 days paternity leave to male employee.

Adequate accommodation (Quarter) facilities on the campus are provided for both teaching and non-teaching staff.

6.3.4 What are the measures taken by the University for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

• Provisions for EL which is entailed to some of our faculties Yes, there is provision for EL

For Self finance program there is provision of Gratuity and Provident fund

The following provisions are there for attracting and retaining eminent faculty:

- provides TA/DA and Reg. Fee to attend con/Workshop from unifund./UGC
- In many depts. They are provided to and fro free convene to carryout various activities in the various dept.
- They are offered remuneration as per UGC guidelines or many times more than that.
- Their convenience taken into consideration even holidays are considered as working days for them.
- Free accommodation to guest faculty and many other facilities.

6.3.5 Has the university conducted a gender audit during the last four years? If yes, mention a few salient findings.

University has Committee against Sexual Harassment, Equal opportunity cell which takes care about relevant issues.

Gender data is collected every year by statistical cell and it is mentioned in yearly report of university.

6.3.6 Does the university conduct any gender sensitization programmes for its faculty?

- Committee against Sexual Harassment is functioning in the University and conducts relevant programmes regularly.
- MSW deptt. is also active and organizes such activities for students also.
- Female faculties are associated with WILPF.
- Seminars on women empowerment/Awareness on Domestic violence act were conducted.

6.3.7 What is the impact of the University's Academic Staff College Programmes in enhancing the competencies of the university faculty?

At present the university does not have an Academic Staff College. A Proposal has been sent to the UGC for the same.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism available to monitor the effective and efficient use of financial resources?

University has Accounts section in the administrative wing of the university.

• Finance Committee, Planning board, Executive Council, Senate approves the allocation of funds as decided by State Government and UGC.

Execution of purchase and distribution is done by estate, Store dept.; Finance committee takes a final decision in this matter. Purchase related to computer and accessories, Chemical & Glassware related tendering is done through departments and account section makes the payment.

HNGU is the only university in Gujarat adopted double entry system

The Local Fund Audit department is an independent audit department under the administrative control of Finance Department of the State Government which audits yearly the accounts of the university.

UGC – Projects and fund allocated as per guidelines of UGC are transferred to relevant departments/PIs.

Monitoring is done by carrying out internal audits twice a year and Audit by CA is done annually.

6.4.2 Does the university have a mechanism for internal and external audit? Give details.

Yes, as mentioned in 6.4.1, the university conducts internal as well as external audit.

Creation of online Inventory register/Dead stock is in progress.

6.4.3 Are the institution's accounts audited regularly? Have there been any major audit objections, if so, how were they addressed?

Yes. The accounts have been audited regularly as per the intimation and audit programme set by the external audit authority.

Following are the few initiatives taken for the overall improvement.

Teaching:

- The curriculum is revised and updated looking to global trends and local needs.
- Our University was the first among all the state universities to introduce CBCS.
- Departments on the campus are equipped with the excellent infrastructure and the latest teaching aids.
- Dipchandbhai Gardi chair prepares students for various competitive exams and arms students with a competitive edge.

Learning:

- The University has taken several measures to improve the academic atmosphere of the University and many administrative and academic steps and programmes are initiated.
- SPIPA training centre will help university staff in various training activities.
- The students are encouraged for further training, research and skill development at the University and at other places.
- The administrative staffs are also updated with computer skills (recent training with Microsoft) which help them serve better.

Evaluation:

- The evaluation system includes both internal and external exams for each paper/ course/program.
- The internal marks of the students are further divided into various modes like tests, assignments, oral viva, etc.
- Remedial classes are also arranged for slow learners.

6.5.3 Is there a central body within the university to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

The Board of University Teaching and Research

The Board of University Teaching and Research is responsible for maintenance of standards of Post-Graduate teaching and research and also makes recommendations regarding the admission to and evaluation of research degrees. (Statute -177)

The Academic Council is the Academic body of the University which is responsible for the maintenance and standards of teaching and examination of the university.

The Board of Studies

The Board of Studies recommends courses of studies in the subject in which the board is concerned and prescribes necessary books for study in the subject.

The College Development Committee

The College Development Committee ensures the proper planning and integrated development of affiliated colleges and provides the colleges necessary help and guidance in their development. It serves as a link between the University, the University Grant Commission, the State Education Department and the Affiliated Colleges. (Statute -196)

6.5.4 How has IQAC contributed to institutionalizing quality assurance strategies and processes?

The IQAC has helped institutionalize and streamline the process of quality assurance regarding the functioning of all aspects of the institution. The IQAC has a formal structure and holds regular meetings and communicates its findings to the different departments and administrative sections along with suggestions for improvement.

- Phased introduction of e-governance (file tracking system, digitalization of records, single window system) for timely, transparent and quality delivery of various services to students, employees and employers.
- Promotion of linkage between academia and industry.
- Adoption of zero tolerance policy towards plagiarism.

6.5.6 Does the IQAC have external members on its committees? If so, mention any significant contribution made by such members.

YES, IQAC committee consists of internal members from university itself and external member as special invitee.

6.5.7 Has the IQAC conducted any study on the incremental academic growth of students from disadvantaged sections of society?

So far no study has been conducted on incremental academic growth of students from disadvantaged section of society, but due care

is being taken to facilitate such students, there are different cells which are working for disadvantaged students like SC/ST cell, Equal opportunity cell, career counseling cell, CASH, etc.

The Planning Board (Statute -75)

Motivate Board of Studies in all subjects to review and modify different syllabi in the Departments and affiliated colleges.

CRITERION VII INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

Introduction

At every stage in its 25 years of history, the Hemchandracharya North Gujarat University has followed innovative and healthy practices for all its stakeholders and Higher Education at large. Higher educational institutions are expected to build optimally healthy practices in following areas:

- 1. Motivating students for diverse talent and ways of learning.
- 2. Encouraging increased interaction between students and faculty.
- 3. Developing cooperation among students.
- 4. Active learning through advanced teaching tools.
- 5. Total quality management in university education system.
- 6. Delegation of authority to staff and continuous feedback and monitoring system.

The essence of innovation consists in improving the human knowledge so that it can serve the society in a better way. The university follows the best practices and innovations in the field of learning process, human development and research.

7.1 Environment consciousness

7.1.1 Does University Conduct green audit for its campus:

The university has eco-friendly campus which addresses the issues of carbon neutrality, waste management and focuses on the plantations inside the campus. The university also encourages the students to reduce pollution inside the campus. All laboratories of science and technology departments are advised to follow the university recommended standard and safety measures. The department of industrial safety conducts regular audit of all departments and sections inside the university campus and advises them to follow strict safety measures.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the university to make campus eco-friendly:

Energy Conservations: The University is conscious about energy conservation on the campus. The following steps have been taken by the university to reduce energy consumption which in the long run helps to conserve energy:

- All electricity fittings are done with energy efficient tools like MCB and ELCB.
- Plans are underway to use solar energy power on the campuses to reduce power consumption and use alternative sources of generating power which would help in overcoming the power crisis.

- Air-conditioners are installed where there is utmost need and the air-conditioning units are branded and energy efficient.
- All buildings in the university campus have adequate ventilation and sunlight. It reduces the energy consumption during day-time.

Water Harvesting: Rain water harvesting is planned for all the new/proposed constructions in the University.

Drinking water safety: The ground water in the city has a very high level of fluoride. Therefore, the university has installed RO plants in all buildings including hostel buildings of the university campus. All water tanks are cleaned at a stipulated time. The RO and water purification system is serviced regularly.

Efforts for carbon neutrality: The University has planted Neem and other trees which support carbon neutrality. The campus has been declared as "NO SMOKING' zone. The university encourages reuse of waste paper for regular administrative use. All waste papers, specially used answer books are sent for pulping by tender mechanism. The burning of laboratory waste and other waste materials is done with due care.

Hazardous waste Management: The disposable bio-waste and hazardous waste materials of laboratories are disposed as per the standards and laws set by the Government.

Plantations: The University conducts various awareness programmes for tree plantations for the students and society as a whole. The estate department of the university is given the overall responsibility to manage tree plantations inside the university campus.

Use of renewable energy: Plans are underway to use solar energy on the campuses to reduce power consumption and use alternative sources of generating power which would help in overcoming the power crisis. University has plans to install solar lights.

Safety Audit: The Department of Industrial safety conducts regular safety audit in all departments of the university. It also prepares reports and suggests precautionary measures to be adopted by concerned departments for the safety of students.

7.2 Innovations:

The universities are meant for research. The university requires innovations in Education, Research and Governance. The innovative

practices by the Hemchandracharya North Gujarat University in all three areas are given below:

7.2.1 Innovations in Education:

To nurture the innovation in education, this university has initiated the following steps:

- * Case based learning method in professional courses.
- * Developing students' creative thinking and problem solving capacity
- * Introducing innovative courses like health care management, environment safety and vocational course like fashion designing to address th problem of employability of the students and expectations of the employers.
- * To encourage and promote the faculty members to avail of various fellowships.
- * Making use of technology in classroom teaching.

The university also follows innovative approaches by introducing Innovative programmes looking to the societal needs like:

- o Programmes related to healthcare management: Master of Hospital Management and Executive programme for Inservice doctors.
- o Five year integrated programmes like; M. Sc. (CA& IT) and MCA
- o Programme for environment safety like; Post-Graduate Diploma in Industrial Safety.
- o The university has started Vocational courses on university campus with the financial support from University Grant Commission (UGC) from the academic year: 2014-15.
- o Plans are under way to start a Setelite campus of the university for tribal students. Recently, the university has acquired 100 acres of land from the state government at Vadali- Khedbhramma, District- Sabarkantha.

7.2.2 Innovations in Research:

Encouraging Faculty for research Work: Research workshops are organized regularly to encourage the faculty members for research. They are also taught to prepare research proposals, which is mentioned in criteria no: III.

Dissemination of research findings: Lab to Land programme has been initiated to ensure that all innovations achieved in all the laboratories of the Hemchandracharya North Gujarat University are shared with people at the grass root

level. Within this framework, the healthy practices introduced in the Hemchandracharya North Gujarat University can be classified as innovations which foster Institutional Health, healthy practices for Teachers as academic, service related, motivational and quality upgrading efforts, Healthy practices for Students as academic, infrastructural, financial and health support oriented efforts, Healthy practices for Administrative, Technical and Other Non-Teaching Staff Members.

7.2.3 Innovations in Governance:

The governance structure is based on delegations of powers and authority. The university follows good governance practices for the betterment of students as well as for the society. The university has a consistent record of declaring results of the examinations on time. The university has prepared citizen charter for the students wherein the time duration is specified for each kind of activity. The university also provides helpline facility for students. The single window system has been introduced by the university, so that students are provided quick and efficient service.

7.3 Best Practices:

7.3.1 Vision & Mission statement:

The university has a well defined vision and mission statement. This is displayed at all prominent places of university. The university is striving to work as per the vision and mission statements.

7.3.2 Citizen charter:

The University has prepared citizen charter for the students, which helps the students to know the duration of all types of activities. The time limit is specified for almost all administrative activities of the university. The citizen charter helps the students in getting a better service from the university administration.

7.3.3. Online admission and enrollment process:

The university has introduced online central admission procedure for courses run by the departments of university. The student enrollments procedure is also made online for university departments as well as for affiliated colleges of the university.

7.3.4 Career Guidance and Counseling

Smt. Vidyaben Deepchandbhai Gardi Chair was established through the financial support of Deepchandbhai Gardi in Hem. North Gujarat University Campus to stimulate the competitive approach in students. The aim of this chair is to Circulate information about career opportunities to interested students, Organizing seminars and presentations on personality development programs, Improving communication skills of students, Creating awareness about the opportunities to pursue higher studies in India and abroad, Conducting mock interviews on the campus, Develop competitive potential in graduate students of HNGU for exams like GATE, GCET, JNU, CAT, Develop competitive potential in Post graduate students of HNGU for exam like UGC NET, SET, Develop competitive potential in students of HNGU for job oriented exams like UPSC, GPSC, Bank recruitment , Railway recruitment and Entrepreneurship development

7.3.5 Manay Chetna Udhyarohan Samaroh:

Every year university organizes "Manav Chetna Udhvarohan Saptah". Eminent Speakers are invited to deliver lectures on important Social and Religious issues where, University staff and peoples from Society are invited as audience.

7.3.6 Budhvariyu:

The central library of the university organizes 'budhvariyu', on every Wednesday , where vice-chancellor, Pro-vice chancellor, faculty members, librarian discuss various topics. The group discussion helps the students to acquire knowledge other than their study topics.

7.3.7 SPIPA Center:

University has started sub center of SPIPA (Sardar Patel Institute of Public Administration), to prepare students for competitive examination like UPSC and GPSC. The center started functioning from the academic year: 2014-15.

7.3.8 Dissemination of research findings

Lab to Land programme has been initiated to ensure that all innovations achieved in all the laboratories of the Hemchandracharya North Gujarat University are shared with people at the grass root level. The university has established 'Central Instrumentation Facility for Science and Technology Departments with the financial support from UGC. The samples of goods produced in the industries are also tested in the laboratory.

7.3.9 University library system

The campus of University is served by a large central library. All data pertaining to books and journals in the library are available in the computer system of the library. Besides maintaining a collection of print materials, the University Library system also maintains a collection of e- resources on CDs and also subscribes to e-journals under UGC's INFONET programme. The primary motto of the international cell is to provide educational excellence and culturally appropriate ambience to all international students.

7.3.12 National Service Scheme (NSS)

The NSS Unit of the University organizes regular and special camps related to health and hygiene, literacy, etc. These camps are usually held in the campuses of affiliated colleges or in the adopted

villages. The activities in the camps involve various youth-related seminars, workshops and training programmes.

7.3.13 Sports and recreation club

For the promotion of sports, the Hemchandracharya North Gujarat University has established facility for indoor games in the Sardar Patel Administrative Building for university staff. The facilities include badminton court, table tennis courts and chess. The Sport facilities for students are provided by Physical Education Department of the university.

7.3.14 SC/ST cell

A Standing Committee for the welfare of SC/ST has been constituted in the University to look after the welfare of SC/ST students. A Special Cell for the welfare of students belonging to Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes has been set up. The Cell has the responsibilities of Closely monitoring the implementation of the reservation policy of the State Government in admission and hostel accommodation, Collecting data from the university departments and affiliated colleges regarding admission of SC/ST students and hostel accommodation. SC/ST students can contact the SC/ST Cell of the University for any guidance and redressal of grievances.

7.3.15 Women Sexual Harassment Redressal Cell

Sexual Harassment Redressal Cell has been established to promote the well being of the students and staff in the University. A committee has been constituted to deal with cases of sexual harassment. The committee organized various seminars regarding legal awareness about sexual harassment.

# **University Library Profile**

#### Introduction

The library was started along with the establishment of the University in the year 1986. The library was established on 15th January, 1988. Initially It was housed in the Gandhi Memorial Hall. The University received a donation of Rs.51 lakhs from Dr. M. S. Patel Trust, Mumbai for the construction of the library building, hence the library is named as Shivabhai Umedbhai Patel Library. The state government had also sanctioned Rs. 25 lakhs. Overall Rs. 85,69,616 has been spent for the construction of the two storied library building. The total built up area of the building is 2486.41 sq. meter. The Rotary Patan City has also donated Rs. 11.50 lakhs for library furniture, reading cabinets and books.

It's annual budget for purchasing of books is Rupees 12,00,000 (University Budget), 23,00,000 (UGC Budjet), 4,00,000 (E-Journals) and for periodicals is Rupees 3,00,000 (2010-2012) Total Rupees 2,85,13,882 has been spent for purchasing of the books. Year 2012-13 University Budget Books Rs. 12,00,000 Periodical Budget Rs. 3,00,000.

The library received the late Dr. B. J. Sandesara's personal library as a gratis. It contains about 4,252 books and some back volumes of literary and indological journals. The collection is very rich in the areas of Gujarati and

Sanskrit literature, History, Culture, Jainology and Indology. The library is also planning to build up a local history museum and Hemchandracharya a corner. Hemchandracharya was a versatile scholar and a great jainnologist of Patan (also known as Anhilwad Patan) who flourished in the 12th century. The documents are being classified according to D.D.C. and A.A.C.R.-II is followed for cataloguing.

#### **Services**

The library provides all the traditional services like Reference, Bibliographical, Literature search, User Education, Inter Library Loan, Photocopy, Audio Visual, Cyber Cafe-Internet, OPAC, Newspaper clipping, CAS, etc. Since last fifteen years the library is also organization weekly discussion group called 'Characha Vartula' for students. It meets every Wednesday hence called as Budhavariyu. Average 25-30 students are regularly attending it and discussion on various subjects.

The Shivabhai Umedbhai Patel Library reprography (Xerox) Service inside the Library to all its members.

### **Reading Hall**

The Shivabhai Umedbhai Patel Library has Constructed a separate reading hall and kept open from 8.00 am to 10.30 pm. Students can bring their personal books and study in this hall without any disturbance. This Reading Hall has the capacity to accommodate 160 students at a time and it is being used extensively.

#### **Research Room**

The library has a separate Research Room with A.C facility. This Research Room has the capacity to accommodate 60 Researchers at a time.

#### **Reference Section**

The Library has constructed a separate reference hall and kept open from 10.30 am to 6.00 pm. this Reference Hall has the capacity to accommodate 50 students at a time and it is being used extensively.
